However, a condition in the Preliminary Approval specifies preferred minimum areas for lots, which the proposed development does comply with.</p> <p>The proposed residential lot sizes of 720 square metres to 1,082 square metres are consistent with the minimum lot size contained in the Preliminary Approval for the Traditional Residential Precinct.</p> <p>Therefore, the proposal is considered to achieve compliance with the performance criteria.</p>

1.0 ADMINISTRATION

1.1 The developer and their employee, agent, contractor, or invitee is responsible for ensuring compliance with the conditions of this development approval.

1.2 Where these Conditions refer to “Council” in relation to requiring Council to approve or to be satisfied as to any matter, or conferring on the Council a function, power, or discretion, that role may be fulfilled in whole or in part by a delegate appointed for that purpose by the Council.

1.3 All conditions, works, or requirements of this development approval must be undertaken, completed, and be accompanied by a compliance with condition notice for any operational works required by this development approval:

1.3.1 to Council’s satisfaction.

1.3.2 at no cost to Council; and

1.3.3 prior to the issue of the Survey Plan Approval Certificate,  
unless otherwise stated.

1.4 Infrastructure requirements of this development approval must be contributed to the relevant authorities, where applicable, at no cost to Council, prior to the issue of the Survey Plan Approval Certificate, unless otherwise stated.

1.5 The following further Development Permits must be obtained prior to the commencement of any works associated with their purposes:

1.5.1 Operational Works:

(i) Road Works.

(ii) Sewerage Works.

(iii) Water Works.

(iv) Stormwater Works.

(v) Inter-allotment Drainage Works.

(vi) Site Works; and

(vii) Landscaping Works

1.6 All works must be designed, constructed, and maintained in accordance with the relevant Council policies, guidelines, and standards, unless otherwise stated.

1.7 All engineering drawings/specifications, design and construction works must be in accordance with the requirements of the relevant *Australian Standards* and must be approved, supervised, and certified by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland.

1.8 Street numbering for the development must be in accordance with *Australian/New Zealand Standard for Rural and Urban Addressing (AS4819:2011)*. Council will allocate street numbering to the development in accordance with this standard at the time of issuing the Survey Plan Approval Certificate.

1.9 All development conditions contained in this development approval about *Infrastructure* under Chapter 4 of the *Planning Act 2016* (the Act), should be read as being non-trunk infrastructure conditioned under section 145 of the Act, unless otherwise stated.

1.10 The currency period for Stages 7A, 7B and 7C is eight (8) years from the date this approval takes effect.

2.0 APPROVED PLANS AND DOCUMENTS

- 2.1 The approved development must be completed and maintained generally in accordance with the approved plans and documents, except were amended by any condition of this development approval:

- 2.2 Where there is any conflict between the conditions of this development approval and the details shown on the approved plans and documents, the conditions of this development approval must prevail.

### 3.0 STAGED DEVELOPMENT

- 3.1 This development approval is for a development to be undertaken in three (3) discrete stages, namely:

- 3.1.1 Lot 617 to Lot 634 (Stage 7A).
- 3.1.2 Lot 610 - 616 and Lot 635 - 641 (Stage 7B); and
- 3.1.3 Lot 605 - 609 and Lot 642 - 646 (Stage 7C),

in accordance with the approved reconfiguration plan (refer to condition 2.1).

- 3.2 Stage 1 (refer to condition 2.1, Concept Plan 8066-EP-CPT-E) must be completed prior to Stage 7.

- 3.3 Unless otherwise expressly stated, the conditions must be read as being applicable to all stages.

### 4.0 ROAD WORKS

- 4.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (road works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any road works required by this development approval.
- 4.2 All road works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*, relevant *Australian Standards* and *Austroroads Guidelines* and the provisions of a Development Permit for Operational Works (road works).
- 4.3 Any application for a Development Permit for Operational Works (road works) must demonstrate that all new roads and road reserves included in the application connect with existing constructed road(s) at the time of making the application.
- 4.4 Aquila Drive must be designed and constructed to “*Minor Urban Collector*” Standard, with kerb and channel, pedestrian pathways, lighting, and drainage infrastructure.
- 4.5 Willowdale Drive, Evergrove Avenue and Fernback Avenue must be designed and constructed to “*Access Street*” standard with kerb and channel, pedestrian pathways, lighting, and drainage infrastructure.
- 4.6 All new *cul-de-sac* roads (Acacia Court) shown on the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1) must comply with the requirements “*Access Place*” in accordance with the *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*.
- 4.7 Traffic barrier devices must be provided between Acacia Court (cul-de-sac) and Aquila Drive to prevent vehicle movements. Details of traffic devices and practical access to adjacent allotments must be demonstrated in any application for a Development Permit for Operational Works (road works).
- 4.8 A concrete pathway, with a minimum width of 1.5 metres, must be constructed on the eastern side along Willowdale Drive and Aquila Drive, for the full length of the development site.

- 4.9 All pathways must incorporate kerb ramps at all road crossing points.
- 4.10 All pathways and access ramps must be designed and constructed in accordance with Australian Standard AS1428 "Design for access and mobility". All pathways located within a road reserve or public use land must be provided with public space lighting in accordance with Australian Standard AS1158 "Lighting for roads and public spaces".
- 4.11 The design and construction of all terminating roads must include a temporary turning area, which complies with the relevant performance and technical criteria, and facilitates suitable turning movements for a refuse collection vehicle.
- 4.12 Traffic signs and pavement markings must be provided in accordance with the *Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices – Queensland*. Where necessary, existing traffic signs and pavement markings must be modified in accordance with the *Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices – Queensland*.
- 4.13 Retaining structures and their foundations must be wholly contained within private allotments and not be constructed as Council-owned infrastructure.
- 4.14 Any application for a development permit for operational works (road works) must include details of the Council approved road names for all new roads.
- 4.15 All vehicular access to and from proposed lots 623 to 628 (inclusive) must be obtained via the proposed new internal roads only. Direct vehicular access to McLaughlin Street is prohibited. A property note to this effect will be entered against Lots 623 to 628 (inclusive).

#### 5.0 SEWERAGE WORKS

- 5.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (sewerage works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any sewerage works required by this development approval.
- 5.2 All sewerage works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*, *Water Supply (Safety and Reliability) Act 2008*, *Plumbing and Drainage Act 2018* and the provisions of a Development Permit for Operational Works (sewerage works).
- 5.3 All lots within the development must be connected to Council's reticulated sewerage network. Each lot must be provided with its own separate sewerage connection point, located wholly within its respective property boundary.
- 5.4 Sewerage infrastructure must be provided to the upstream development boundary for connectivity.
- 5.5 Any proposed sewerage access chambers located within a park or reserve, or below a ten per cent (10%) Annual exceedance probability level must be provided with bolt down lids.
- 5.6 Easements must be provided over all sewerage infrastructure located within private property. The easement location(s) and width(s) must be in accordance with the requirements of the *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*.
- 5.7 The proposed sewerage main size and alignment within the stage 7 must be in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1).
- 5.8 An existing 300 millimetre diameter sewerage located within drainage channel, adjacent to Willowdale drive, must be extended along the proposed drainage channel and terminated at the common boundary of Lots 626 and 627. This necessary infrastructure is conditioned under section 128 of the *Planning Act 2016*.
- 5.9 A 150 millimetre diameter sewerage main must be constructed across proposed drainage channel, from the termination point of the 300 millimetre diameter sewerage main (refer to condition 5.8). This 150 millimetre sewerage main must be terminated with an access chamber at the eastern property boundary.

#### 6.0 WATER WORKS

- 6.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (water works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any water works required by this development approval.
- 6.2 All water works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*, *Water Supply (Safety and Reliability) Act 2008*, *Plumbing and Drainage Act 2018* and the provisions of a Development Permit for Operational Works (water works).

- 6.3 All lots within the development must be connected to Council's reticulated water network. Each lot must be provided with its own separate water connection point, located wholly within its respective property boundary.
- 6.4 Water infrastructure must be provided to the development boundaries for connectivity.
- 6.5 Easements must be provided over all water infrastructure located within private property. The easement location(s) and width(s) must be in accordance with the requirements of the *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*.
- 6.6 All proposed reticulated water network mains must be interconnected to eliminate dead ends. Looped mains are permitted in culs-de-sac.
- 6.7 As a part of stage 7B a 200 millimetre diameter High Zone Water main must be constructed from the Water Booster Pump station at the Birkbeck Drive reservoir site, along McLaughlin Street to the north, to the new access point for Precinct 2. This infrastructure is conditioned under section 145 of the *Planning Act 2016*.
- 6.8 As a part of stage 7B a 150 millimetre diameter High Zone Water Main must be constructed from the 200 millimetre high zone water main (refer condition 7.7), through the balance parcel of land to service the stage 7B allotment above thirty-five (35) metres AHD (Australian Height Datum). The water main must be contained within an easement with a minimum width of five (5) meters. This non trunk infrastructure is conditioned under section 145 of the *Planning Act 2016*. Proposed Lots 610 to 615 must be connected to the High Zone Water Main.

Note: If the Water Infrastructure is constructed within the established road reserve, no easements will be required.

## 7.0 STORMWATER WORKS

- 7.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (stormwater works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any stormwater works required by this development approval.
- 7.2 All stormwater drainage works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), *Queensland Urban Drainage Manual*, *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*, sound engineering practice and the provisions of a Development Permit for Operational Works (stormwater works).
- 7.3 All stormwaters must drain to a demonstrated lawful point of discharge and must not adversely affect surrounding land or infrastructure in comparison to the pre-development conditions, including but not limited to blocking, altering, or diverting existing stormwater runoff patterns or having the potential to cause damage to other infrastructure.
- 7.4 Each allotment must be designed to be flood free in a one per cent (1%) Annual exceedance probability defined flood event.
- 7.5 Easements must be provided over all stormwater infrastructure located within private property. The easement location(s) and width(s) must be in accordance with the requirements of the *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*.
- 7.6 Any application for a Development Permit for Operational Works (stormwater works) must be accompanied by a detailed Stormwater Management Plan, prepared, and certified by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland. The Stormwater Management Plan must clearly demonstrate that:
- 7.6.1 all content of the stormwater management plan is in accordance with the *Queensland Urban Drainage Manual*, *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*, stormwater management design objectives in *State Planning Policy 2017*, and sound engineering practice.
  - 7.6.2 the potential pollutants in stormwater discharged from the development site are managed in accordance with current water quality best industry practices and in accordance with *State Planning Policy 2017*.
  - 7.6.3 the stormwater management plan is accompanied by full calculations; including electronic modelling files from industry standard modelling software, (including both electronic model files and results files) and all details of the modelling assumptions to support both the proposed water quantity and quality management strategy; and



- 7.6.4 it includes detailed engineering plans with details of any new drainage systems, or the amendment and upgrading of existing drainage systems to implement the proposed drainage strategy.
- 7.6.5 It includes details demonstrating that 1% AEP runoff will be contained within the road reserve and the pipe network, (in particular, Acacia Court, Fernback Avenue and Willowdale Drive).
- 7.7 The proposed drainage channel must be adequately lined (side slope and base) to ensure the stability.
- 7.8 Any application for a Development Permit for Operational Works (stormwater works) must demonstrate that the proposed drainage channel will efficiently flow during minor storm event(s). Appropriate maintenance access must be provided for mowing or debris removal.
- 7.9 Detailed design of the proposed channel and any cross-drainage structures must include all required safety measures and facilities to ensure the safety of the public in accordance with the *Queensland Urban Drainage Manual*.
- 8.0 INTER-ALLOTMENT DRAINAGE WORKS
- 8.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (inter-allotment drainage works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any drainage works required by this development approval.
- 8.2 All inter-allotment drainage works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the approved plans (refer to condition 2.1), *Queensland Urban Drainage Manual*, *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*, sound engineering practice and the provisions of a Development Permit for Operational Works (inter-allotment drainage works).
- 8.3 Inter-allotment drainage, must be designed and constructed in accordance with the *Queensland Urban Drainage Manual* and must be provided to any lot where it cannot be satisfactorily demonstrated that roof and allotment runoff associated with development on that lot, could not reasonably be directed to the frontage kerb and channel or alternative lawful point of discharge.
- 8.4 Inter-allotment drainage systems and overland flow paths must be wholly contained within a Council easement and be in accordance with the minimum widths prescribed in the *Capricorn Municipal Design Guidelines*. Easement documents must accompany the Survey Plan for endorsement by Council, prior to the issue of the Survey Plan Approval Certificate.
- 9.0 SITE WORKS
- 9.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (site works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any site works on the development site.
- 9.2 Any application for a Development Permit for Operational Works (site works) must be accompanied by an earthworks plan that clearly identifies the following:
- 9.2.1 the location of cut and/or fill.
- 9.2.2 the type of fill to be used and the way it is to be compacted.
- 9.2.3 the quantum of fill to be deposited or removed and finished cut and/or fill levels.
- 9.2.4 details of any proposed access routes that are intended to be used to transport fill to or from the development site; and
- 9.2.5 the maintenance of access roads to and from the development site so that they are free of all cuts and/or fill material and cleaned as necessary.
- 9.3 A Geotechnical Report prepared by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland must be provided with the first application for a Development Permit for Operational Works for the subject development site. No works can commence on the development site until this report has been approved by Council.
- 9.4 All earthworks must be undertaken in accordance with *Australian Standard AS3798 "Guidelines on earthworks for commercial and residential developments"*.
- 9.5 Site works must be constructed such that they do not, at any time, in any way restrict, impair, or change the natural flow of runoff water, or cause a nuisance or worsening to surrounding land or infrastructure.

- 9.6 All retaining structures above one (1) meter in height requires separate building approval and certifications by a *Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland*.
- 9.7 Retaining structures close to or crossing sewerage infrastructure must comply with *Queensland Development Code, Mandatory Part 1.4 "Building over or near relevant infrastructure."* The structure must be self-supporting, and no additional load must be applied to Council's sewerage infrastructure.
- 10.0 LANDSCAPING WORKS
- 10.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (landscaping works) must be obtained prior to the commencement of any landscaping works required by this development approval.
- 10.2 All landscaping must be constructed and/or established, in accordance with the requirements of the Development Permit for Operational Works (landscaping works).
- 10.3 Landscaping must be designed in accordance with the requirements of *Australian Standard AS 1428 parts 1, 2, 3 and 4 — Design for access and mobility*.
- 10.4 A minimum of one (1) street tree must be planted per lot.
- 10.5 Street trees are to be provided within the road reserve along McLaughlin Street for the full length of the development site.
- 10.6 The street trees required by Condition 10.4 must be one or a combination of the following species:
- 10.6.1 *Buckinghamia celcissima* – Ivory Curl
  - 10.6.2 *Corymbia ptychocarpa* –Swamp Bloodwood
  - 10.6.3 *Cupaniopsis anacardioides* – Tuckeroo
  - 10.6.4 *Cupaniopsis parvisolia* – Small Leaf Tuckeroo
  - 10.6.5 *Harpullia pendula* – Tulip wood
  - 10.6.6 *Melicope elleryana*- Pink Flowering Euodia
  - 10.6.7 *Syzygium leuhmanii*- Small Leafed Lilly Pilly
  - 10.6.8 *Waterhousia floribunda* – Weeping Lilly Pilly
  - 10.6.9 *Xanthostemon chrysanthus* – Golden Penda
- 10.7 The street trees must:
- 10.7.1 Be planted between one (1) and 1.2 metres from the edge of the kerb;
  - 10.7.2 Be at least three (3) metres from a driveway;
  - 10.7.3 Be at least five (5) metres apart; and
  - 10.7.4 Be at least six (6) metres from the corner of the kerb at street intersections.
- 10.8 Street trees must be maintained by the owner / developer until established.
- Note:** Street trees become the property of Council. Council reserves all rights to trim or remove street trees as per our requirements and in accordance with the current Street Tree Policy.
- 10.9 Street tree planting must be carried out in accordance with the requirements of Planning Scheme Policy SC6.12 - Landscape Design and Street Trees Planning Scheme Policy.
- 10.10 Street trees and landscaping must not impact on vehicle site distances in accordance with Australian Standard AS2890 – Parking Facilities, or unduly restrict visibility to pedestrians in verge areas.
- 10.11 Street trees must be located such that, upon reaching full maturity, must not:
- (i) obstruct sight visibility zones as defined in the *Austroads 'Guide to Traffic Engineering Practice'* series of publications;
  - (ii) adversely affect any road lighting or public space lighting; or
  - (iii) adversely affect any Council infrastructure, or public utility plant in accordance with the *Capricorn Municipal Development Guidelines*.
- 10.12 Any Road Corridor landscaping must comply with the requirements of Planning Scheme Policy SC6.12 - Landscape Design and Street Trees Planning Scheme Policy.

- 10.13 Landscaping hardworks must comply with the requirements of Planning Scheme Policy SC6.12 - Landscape Design and Street Trees Planning Scheme Policy.
- 10.14 Large trees must not be planted within one (1) metre of the centreline of any sewerage infrastructure; small shrubs and groundcover are acceptable.
- 10.15 A minimum two (2) metre high solid acoustic screen fence must be erected along the common boundary of the site and any residential properties adjoining Lot 979 Public Use Lot for a Drainage Channel (Lots 623 to 628). The fence must be constructed of materials and finishes that are aesthetically pleasing and commensurate with the surrounding residential area.
- 10.16 The landscaped areas must be subject to:
- 10.16.1 a watering and maintenance plan during the establishment moment; and
- 10.16.2 an ongoing maintenance and replanting programme.
- 11.0 GEOTECHNICAL
- 11.1 All construction works must be designed and completed in accordance with the recommendations in the Slope Stability Report (refer to condition 2.1).
- 11.2 Slope stability must be managed as follows:
- 11.2.1 all engineering drawings/specifications and designs must be in accordance with the requirements of relevant *Australian Standards* and must be approved by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland;
- 11.2.2 site inspections must be undertaken by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland to confirm the design; and
- 11.2.3 full engineering certification must be undertaken by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland.
- 12.0 STREET LIGHTING
- 12.1 The developer is responsible for all costs associated with the supply and installation of any road lighting or public space lighting in accordance with *Australian Standard AS1158 'Lighting for roads and public spaces'*.
- 12.2 A suitably qualified Electrical Engineering Consultant shall liaise with Council for the approval of street lighting design. The Consultant must appear on Ergon Energy's list of Public Lighting Designers and be a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland.
- 13.0 ELECTRICITY
- 13.1 Underground electricity services to each lot must be provided in accordance with approved Operational Works Plans and the standards and requirements of the relevant service provider.
- 13.2 A *Certificate of Electricity Supply* from the relevant service provider must be provided to Council, prior to the issue of the Survey Plan Approval Certificate.
- Note: The applicant can enter a *Negotiated Connection Establishment Contract* with the Supplier for the provisioning of electrical services and/or street lighting. Provided the Applicant has undertaken all the conditions of the contract, including providing performance security, the Supplier will issue a *Certificate of Electricity Supply*.
- 14.0 TELECOMMUNICATIONS
- 14.1 Provide Fibre-Ready pit and pipe telecommunications infrastructure to each lot within the development in accordance with the Australian Government '*Telecommunications infrastructure in new developments*' policy.
- 14.2 The Telecommunications Act 1997 (Commonwealth) specifies where the deployment of optical fibre and the installation of fibre-ready facilities is required.
- 14.3 Evidence (see below) of acceptance of the works from the relevant service provider must be provided to Council, prior to the issue of the Survey Plan Approval Certificate e.g. This will be a letter from either: -
- NBN** a '*Certificate of Practical Completion*',
- Telstra** a- '*Telecommunications Agreement/Provisioning Letter*',

**A Licenced Carrier** under the Telecommunications Act 1997- (*signed documentation from a Registered Professional Engineer Queensland -electrical engineer.*)

15.0 ASSET MANAGEMENT

- 15.1 Any alteration necessary to electricity, telephone, water mains, sewerage mains, and/or public utility installations resulting from the development or in connection with the development, must be undertaken and completed at no cost to Council.
- 15.2 Any damage to existing stormwater, water supply and sewerage infrastructure, kerb and channel, pathway, or roadway (including removal of concrete slurry from public land and Council infrastructure), that occurs while any works are being carried out in association with this development approval must be repaired at full cost to the developer. This includes the reinstatement of any existing traffic signs or pavement markings that may have been removed or damaged.
- 15.3 'As Constructed' information pertaining to assets to be handed over to Council and those which may have an impact on Council's existing and future assets must be provided prior to the issue of the Survey Plan Approval Certificate. This information must be provided in accordance with the Asset Design and As Constructed Manual (ADAC).

16.0 ENVIRONMENTAL

- 16.1 Any application for a Development Permit for Operational Works must be accompanied by an Erosion and Sediment Control Plan that addresses, but is not limited to, the following:

- (i) objectives.
- (ii) site location and topography
- (iii) vegetation.
- (iv) site drainage.
- (v) soils.
- (vi) erosion susceptibility.
- (vii) erosion risk.
- (viii) concept.
- (ix) design; and
- (x) implementation,

for the construction and post-construction phases of work.

- 16.2 The Erosion Control and Stormwater Control Management Plan prepared by a Registered Professional Engineer of Queensland in accordance with the *Capricorn Municipal Design Guidelines*, must be:

16.2.1 implemented, monitored, and maintained for the duration of the works, and until all exposed soil areas are permanently stabilised (for example, turfed, hydro mulched, concreted, landscaped); and

16.2.2 available on-site for inspection by Council Officers whilst all works are being carried out.

17.0 OPERATING PROCEDURES

- 17.1 All construction materials, waste, waste skips, machinery and contractors' vehicles must be located and stored or parked within the development site. Storage of materials, or parking of construction machinery or contractors' vehicles must not occur within Willowdale Drive, Fernback Avenue, Aquila Drive and Evergrove Avenue or Acacia Court.

ADVISORY NOTES

NOTE 1. Aboriginal Cultural Heritage

It is advised that under section 23 of the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2003*, a person who carries out an activity must take all reasonable and practicable measures to ensure the activity does not harm Aboriginal cultural heritage (the "cultural heritage duty of care"). Maximum penalties for breaching the duty of care are listed in the Aboriginal cultural heritage legislation. NOTE 2. General Environmental Duty

General environmental duty under the *Environmental Protection Act 1994* prohibits unlawful environmental nuisance caused by noise, aerosols, particles, dust, ash, fumes, light, odour, or smoke beyond the boundaries of the development site during all stages of the development including earthworks, construction, and operation.

NOTE 3. General Safety of Public During Construction

The *Work Health and Safety Act 2011* and *Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices* must be complied with in carrying out any construction works, and to ensure safe traffic control and safe public access in respect of works being constructed on a road.

NOTE 4. Infrastructure Charges Notice

This application is subject to infrastructure charges in accordance with Council policies. The charges are presented on an Infrastructure Charges Notice.

NOTE 5. Landscaping

Council approval must be obtained prior to the removal of or interference with street trees located on Council land.

NOTE 6. Property Note (Access)

All vehicular access to and from proposed Lots 623 to 628 (inclusive) must be obtained via the proposed new internal roads only. Direct vehicular access to McLaughlin Street is prohibited.

The following is an extract from the *Planning Act 2016* (Chapter 6)

### Appeal rights

#### 229 Appeals to tribunal or P&E Court

- (1) Schedule 1 states—
- (a) matters that may be appealed to—
    - (i) either a tribunal or the P&E Court; or
    - (ii) only a tribunal; or
    - (iii) only the P&E Court; and
  - (b) the person—
    - (i) who may appeal a matter (the **appellant**); and
    - (ii) who is a respondent in an appeal of the matter; and
    - (iii) who is a co-respondent in an appeal of the matter; and
    - (iv) who may elect to be a co-respondent in an appeal of the matter.
- (2) An appellant may start an appeal within the appeal period.
- (3) The **appeal period** is—
- (a) for an appeal by a building advisory agency—10 business days after a decision notice for the decision is given to the agency or
  - (b) for an appeal against a deemed refusal—at any time after the deemed refusal happens; or
  - (c) for an appeal against a decision of the Minister, under chapter 7, part 4, to register premises or to renew the registration of premises—20 business days after a notice is published under section 269(3)(a) or (4); or
  - (d) for an appeal against an infrastructure charges notice—20 business days after the infrastructure charges notice is given to the person; or
  - (e) for an appeal about a deemed approval of a development application for which a decision notice has not been given—30 business days after the applicant gives the deemed approval notice to the assessment manager; or
  - (f) for any other appeal—20 business days after a notice of the decision for the matter, including an enforcement notice, is given to the person.
- Note—  
See the P&E Court Act for the court's power to extend the appeal period.
- (4) Each respondent and co-respondent for an appeal may be heard in the appeal.
- (5) If an appeal is only about a referral agency's response, the assessment manager may apply to the tribunal or P&E Court to withdraw from the appeal.
- (6) To remove any doubt, it is declared that an appeal against an infrastructure charges notice must not be about—
- (a) the adopted charge itself; or
  - (b) for a decision about an offset or refund—
    - (i) the establishment cost of trunk infrastructure identified in a LGIP; or
    - (ii) the cost of infrastructure decided using the method included in the local government's charges resolution.

#### 230 Notice of appeal

- (1) An appellant starts an appeal by lodging, with the registrar of the tribunal or P&E Court, a notice of appeal that—
  - (a) is in the approved form; and
  - (b) succinctly states the grounds of the appeal.
- (2) The notice of appeal must be accompanied by the required fee.
- (3) The appellant or, for an appeal to a tribunal, the registrar must, within the service period, give a copy of the notice of appeal to—

- (a) the respondent for the appeal; and
  - (b) each co-respondent for the appeal; and
  - (c) for an appeal about a development application under schedule 1, table 1, item 1—each principal submitter for the development application; and
  - (d) for an appeal about a change application under schedule 1, table 1, item 2—each principal submitter for the change application; and
  - (e) each person who may elect to become a co-respondent for the appeal, other than an eligible submitter who is not a principal submitter in an appeal under paragraph (c) or (d); and
  - (f) for an appeal to the P&E Court—the chief executive; and
  - (g) for an appeal to a tribunal under another Act—any other person who the registrar considers appropriate.
- (4) The **service period** is—
- (a) if a submitter or advice agency started the appeal in the P&E Court—2 business days after the appeal is started; or
  - (b) otherwise—10 business days after the appeal is started.
- (5) A notice of appeal given to a person who may elect to be a co-respondent must state the effect of subsection
- (6) A person elects to be a co-respondent by filing a notice of election, in the approved form, within 10 business days after the notice of appeal is given to the person.

#### 231 Other appeals

- (1) Subject to this chapter, schedule 1 and the P&E Court Act, unless the Supreme Court decides a decision or other matter under this Act is affected by jurisdictional error, the decision or matter is non-appealable.
- (2) The Judicial Review Act 1991, part 5 applies to the decision or matter to the extent it is affected by jurisdictional error.
- (3) A person who, but for subsection (1) could have made an application under the Judicial Review Act 1991 in relation to the decision or matter, may apply under part 4 of that Act for a statement of reasons in relation to the decision or matter.
- (4) In this section— **decision** includes—
  - (a) conduct engaged in for the purpose of making a decision; and
  - (b) other conduct that relates to the making of a decision; and
  - (c) the making of a decision or the failure to make a decision; and
  - (d) a purported decision; and
  - (e) a deemed refusal.

**non-appealable**, for a decision or matter, means the decision or matter—

- (a) is final and conclusive; and
- (b) may not be challenged, appealed against, reviewed, quashed, set aside or called into question in any other way under the Judicial Review Act 1991 or otherwise, whether by the Supreme Court, another court, a tribunal or another entity; and
- (c) is not subject to any declaratory, injunctive or other order of the Supreme Court, another court, a tribunal or another entity on any ground.

#### 232 Rules of the P&E Court

- (1) A person who is appealing to the P&E Court must comply with the rules of the court that apply to the appeal.
- (2) However, the P&E Court may hear and decide an appeal even if the person has not complied with rules of the P&E Court.

    - (i) the development approval is only for a material change of use that involves the use of a building classified under the Building Code as a class 2 building; and
    - (ii) the building is, or is proposed to be, not more than 3 storeys; and
    - (iii) the proposed development is for not more than 60 sole-occupancy units; or
  - (e) a decision for, or a deemed refusal of, an extension application for a development approval that is only for a material change of use of a classified building; or
  - (f) a decision for, or a deemed refusal of, a change application for a development approval that is only for a material change of use of a classified building; or
  - (g) a matter under this Act, to the extent the matter relates to—
    - (i) the Building Act, other than a matter under that Act that may or must be decided by the Queensland Building and Construction Commission; or
    - (ii) the Plumbing and Drainage Act, part 4 or 5; or
  - (h) a decision to give an enforcement notice in relation to a matter under paragraphs (a) to (g); or
  - (i) a decision to give an infrastructure charges notice; or
  - (j) the refusal, or deemed refusal, of a conversion application; or
  - (k) a matter that, under another Act, may be appealed to the tribunal; or
  - (l) a matter prescribed by regulation.
- (3) Also, table 1 does not apply to a tribunal if the matter involves—
  - (a) for a matter in subsection (2)(a) to (d)—
    - (i) a development approval for which the development application required impact assessment; and
    - (ii) a development approval in relation to which the assessment manager received a properly made submission for the development application; or
  - (b) a provision of a development approval about the identification or inclusion, under a variation approval, of a matter for the development.
- (4) Table 2 states the matters that may be appealed only to the P&E Court.
- (5) Table 3 states the matters that may be appealed only to the tribunal.
- (6) In each table—
  - (a) column 1 states the appellant in the appeal; and
  - (b) column 2 states the respondent in the appeal; and
  - (c) column 3 states the co-respondent (if any) in the appeal; and
  - (d) column 4 states the co-respondents by election (if any) in the appeal.
- (7) If the chief executive receives a notice of appeal under section 230(3)(f), the chief executive may elect to be a co-respondent in the appeal.
